How to Prepare for Christmas

Think about it this way. We prepare for everything we consider important in life. You wouldn't show up to play in a football game and expect to win if you had been training. You wouldn't show up unprepared to give a big presentation at work and expect to get the project. We don't expect to excel in exams if we have not studied. Consider the preparation that goes into hosting a party, barbecue or wedding.

Preparing for Christmas does not mean the typical Christmas preparations like buying and wrapping presents, baking cookies, planning get togethers, putting up the lights, decorating the tree and the house. You need to get yourself ready. When was the last time you prepared your heart for Jesus' coming at Christmas?

ADVENT is a season of preparation. And if we want to experience true magic and meaning of Christmas, we need to get our hearts ready for Christmas.

The word Advent is a word derived from "adventus" which means coming. For Catholics Advent is a four week season leading up to Christmas. During Advent we anticipate the coming of Jesus. It's a time of reflection, excitement and hope.

When Does ADVENT Begin?

ADVENT begins four Sundays before Christmas and ends on December 24th. This year the Sunday's are November 29th, December 6th, December 13th and December 20th with Christmas on a Friday.

Jesus came into the world at the first Christmas for you, to bring meaning and deep satisfaction into your life, to fill you with lasting joy, and ultimately to bring you to eternal happiness with him in heaven. That is what we celebrate at Christmas. Are you ready?

THE ADVENT WREATH

Traditionally, the Advent wreath is a circle of evergreen branches. Both the evergreen branches and the circular shape symbolize the passing of time and eternal life. The shape of the wreath with no beginning or end, reflects the complete and endless love that Jesus has for us. During the Advent season we eagerly anticipate his coming and the promise of eternal live in heaven with him.

The wreath holds four candles and they represent Jesus coming as the light in darkness. One candle is lit each Sunday until all four candles are lit, and sometimes a fifth candle is lit on Christmas. As Christmas draw nearer, each candle brings a little more light into the darkness.

1. The Candle of Hope—Purple "The Prophet's Candle" Purple is the primary color associated with Advent. Within the Catholic Church it symbolizes penance, preparation and sacrifice. During the first week of Advent look forward to Jesus' coming with HOPE.

Dear Jesus,

You are the hope in our messy world. This Advent help us slow down, listen to your voice, and focus on what's really important. WE place our hope in you as we prepare our hearts to celebrate your birth on Christmas. Amen

2. The Candle of Peace—Purple "Bethehem Candle"

During the second week of Advent, we reflect on our lives and work on becoming better-versions-of-ourselves in preparation for Jesus' coming.

Dear Jesus,

You entered our world on Christmas as the Prince of Peace. This Advent, as we strive to become the best versions of ourselves, fill us with a deep and abiding peace. Help us share that peace with everyone we encounter, especially those who need it most. Amen

3. The Candle of Joy-Pink "Shepherd's Candle"

This third candle is pink, symbolizing anticipation and rejoicing! During this third week of Advent, we are filled with joy for the near arrival of Jesus on Christmas Day.

Dear Jesus, Help us to focus on you during this busy season. May we stay aware of the joy you bring into our lives. We want to find you in the everyday moments and come with hearts of gratitude to your manger on *Christmas*. Amen

4. The Candle of Love—Purple "Angel's Candle"

During the final week of Advent we rejoice in the endless love that God has for us, which is made apparent in the birth of his Son.

Dear Jesus, May the light of your love always shite in our hearts. As Christmas draws closer, we marvel at your great love for us. Let your love transform every aspect of our lives and touch everyone we encounter. Our hearts are open to you Jesus. Amen

Heavenly Father, your son, Jesus is your greatest gift to us, a great sign of your love. Guide us as we strive to walk in that love together as a family this Advent. As we prepare our hearts for Christmas, bring us closer to each other and to your son. Give us the grace and strength we need everyday. Help us to always trust in you. Come Lord Jesus, lead all people closer to you. Come and dispel the darkness of our world with the light of your love. Amen




