




AUGUSTINE: A VOICE FOR ALL GENERATIONS WITH MIKE AQUILINA

FORMED NOW: THE FEAST OF SAINT MONICA



Going on a pilgrimage is a wonderful way to build faith and strengthen spirituality. On Thursday, August 5, a small group of parishioners from The Historic Church of Saint Patrick made a pilgrimage to the **Solanus Casey Center** in Detroit. The afternoon spent at St. Bonaventure Monastery refreshed their souls and inspired their hearts.

Blessed Solanus Casey, Capuchin priest, was a humble man focused on doing what God wanted of him. His gifts were not properly recognized by the Capuchins at the turn of the last century, who regulated him to more menial tasks for the order. Although they ordained him a priest, Father Solanus was not allowed to hear confessions nor give homilies. He persevered and touched the lives of countless

men and women during his lifetime. The Capuchins are now awaiting a final miracle that will allow the Catholic

Church to declare Blessed Solanus Casey a saint.
